Formal rebuke over anti-Christian comments

The Judicial Conduct Investigations Office this week <u>formally rebuked</u> <u>panel member Mr Jed Purkis</u> stating his public comments criticising Christians amounted to misconduct.

His comments came to light in the case of Christian teacher <u>'Hannah'</u> who is being supported by our legal team. She was sacked for raising safeguarding concerns about a child being allowed to 'socially transition' at the school.

Purkis was recused from the hearing in her case after comments he had made online were found. The comments included describing Conservatives as 'tumours' and said 'if [Christians] are so f***ing super how comes there is so much s**t going on in the world.' The whole panel ended up recusing themselves to avoid 'perception of bias.'

The recusal and the formal rebuke further illustrates the presence of anti-Christian bias in the courts. Purkis was also part of the panel that previously ruled against <u>Rev. Dr Bernard Randall</u>, which is being appealed.

Christians arrested in Paris for bus 'protest'
Six Christians from CitizenGO, including two from the United Kingdom were arrested and held overnight in a French jail for driving a bus through Paris that said "Stop Attack on Christians", criticising the Olympic opening ceremony.
CitizenGO's Campaigns Manager Caroline Farrow, wrote "All of their belongings were confiscated, they were stripped and searched, and they were illegally denied to call their personal lawyers. Some were even not allowed to call their family members and were held on non-existent charges."
The team were eventually released.

Roger Kiska, standing counsel to the Christian Legal Centre's appeared on GB News with Neil Oliver to discuss the recent end of life legal win in the case of Sudiksha Thirumalesh. Doctors had argued in court that 19-year-old's desire to continue treatment was 'delusional'.

Neil Oliver said at the beginning of the interview, "when this story was brought to my attention last year I thought it couldn't be true."

Roger also discussed Sudiksha's posthumous win with Calvin Robinson on Lotus Eaters, where they also spoke about the case of Claire Brennan, who could be the <u>first woman in Northern Ireland to be convicted for praying inside an abortion 'censorship zone</u>'.
