Welby 'whitewashed' complaint in blacklist case

Rev. Dr Bernard Randall lost his job as a school chaplain after preaching a sermon on 'competing ideologies' in his school chapel, where he said that students shouldn't feel compelled to believe in any ideology.

But it is his treatment at the hands of the Church of England that is most unreasonable. He has been blacklisted in his diocese and has been unable to pursue further ministry, with his agreement with the church's teaching labelled as a 'risk factor'.

This week, his story has made headlines with the revelation that the Archbishop of Canterbury and Bishop of Derby have both been criticised by the President of Tribunals for errors made in his case. But six months after the judgment, Bernard is still blacklisted.

Bernard is still challenging his treatment with the help of the Christian Legal Centre. The story was covered by the <u>The Telegraph</u>, the <u>Free Speech Union</u>, and <u>Christian Today</u> among others.

We have started a <u>petition</u> to get the Archbishop of Canterbury to apologise to Bernard and give him his life back.

## When will bishops be held to account?

Bernard Randall wrote for the Critic this week, asking when bishops will be held to account.

He explained:

"Gregory Jones KC, acting for the President of Tribunals (the Church's most senior legal officer), found that the Archbishop was plainly wrong on nine of the headings, a ruling running to 98 paragraphs on 33 pages. 'Plainly wrong' is a very high bar, much higher than just 'I would have reached a very different conclusion.' In legal speak it means no reasonable person could have reached that conclusion. This suggests that the Archbishop was acting from something other than a rational evaluation of the case. Ouch."

Bernard also spoke about his case with <u>Patrick Christys on GB News</u>, as well as <u>Lembit Öpik on TNT radio</u>.

Though based in Barbados, the group reached out to the Christian Legal Centre for support. Subsequently, they called for an investigation into their disqualification.

The senator responsible for upholding the group's disqualification has now admitted 'there was a real perception of bias' when he made his ruling.

## Prayer outside abortion centres can save lives

Fox News reported on Christian Legal Centre client Claire Brennan this week, who was the first arrested in Northern Ireland for praying outside an abortion facility.

The outside of an abortion centre might be the final chance a pregnant mother has to reconsider her decision. However, the Telegraph reported today that the Home Office is going to consider banning silent prayer outside abortion clinics by introducing 'buffer zones'.

"The implementation of buffer zones around the country is a step backwards for freedom of movement, freedom of speech, freedom of religion, freedom to pray," our chief executive, <u>Andrea Williams told the BBC</u>. "We can't criminalise the mere presence of people."

"Those women saved my daughter's life," said 'Sarah', who also shared her testimony on the BBC.
