A Christian educational behavioural assistant has launched legal action after losing her job for social media posts about marriage.

Before and during her employment at a Catholic school, Gozen Soydag ran social media accounts to encourage Christian women - owngozen - which included posts supporting a biblical vision of marriage.

But on her birthday last year, she lost her job after complaints about some of the content on her channels. The school claimed that "much of [her] extensive online profile [was] incompatible with the school's mission statement and ethos" - even though it was plainly consistent with the Catholic and Christian views the school's ethos claims to uphold.

In a new video on our YouTube channel, <u>Gozen recounts what happened in the school and why she believes</u> we must speak up.

With the support of the Christian Legal Centre, Gozen has had her case heard by an employment tribunal this week.

Family in race against time to save mother's life

A Christian family, gagged by a Court of Protection 'transparency order', are in a <u>race against time to save the life of their 54-year-old mother and grandmother known only as "XY"</u>, after a UK judge ruled that her right to live is 'outweighed' by the medical evidence, and it is therefore in her 'best interests' to die.

Supported by the Christian Legal Centre, the family have urgently applied for Interim Measures from the European Court of Human Rights (ECHR) to prevent the removal of an artificial airway and clinically-assisted nutrition and hydration.

This is reminiscent of the previous Christian Legal Centre case on behalf of a <u>Polish man known as 'RS'</u>, who was tragically <u>dehydrated to death after a Judge deemed his life worthless</u>, and ordered that he be deprived of nutrition and fluids.

Pray for the Christian Legal Centre lawyers as they argue for XY's right to continue receiving food and water, and that her family would be comforted and supported.



Crackdown against soaring home education?

According to the Times, home education has <u>"soared by a fifth in England over the past year"</u>.

There have also been increased <u>calls for "children at risk of abuse" to be prevented from being home educated and for stricter regulations to be imposed</u>. However, this could eventually target Christian parents deemed 'abusive' for not supporting their children's 'gender transition'.



Islam

After an 8-week murder trial, Sara Sharif's father and stepmother have been found guilty of the <u>horrific torture and murder of the 10-year-old.</u>

MP Will Forster <u>raised concerns about the effect that "cultural sensitivities" may have</u> had in preventing Sara's abuse from being reported and effectively investigated. After teachers noticed bruises on her head and neck, Sara was forced to wear a hijab for the last 8 months of her life.

The Guardian also revealed that <u>Iranian women "could face the death sentence or up to 15 years in prison" for defying "new compulsory morality laws"</u> that further restrict women's rights and prohibit unveiling and 'improper' dressing.

Pray that public officials and teachers will call out abusive Islamic practices, that women and children would be protected in Islamic nations and communities, and that Christians would be equipped to bring the hope of the gospel to Muslims.

End of life

As Kim Leadbeater publicised the <u>assisted suicide bill committee</u> <u>members</u>, the Independent reported that MPs opposed to the bill have expressed <u>deep concern that the committee is a "stitch-up"</u> designed to hinder adequate scrutiny.

Meanwhile, the Daily Mail reinforced concerns that the 'High Court judge safeguard' requiring a judge to sign-off each assisted suicide request 'could be dropped amid fears of lengthy court backlogs'.

The BBC also revealed that euthanasia, which in Canada is called <u>Medical Assistance in Dying (MAiD)</u>, now accounts for <u>'nearly one in 20 deaths'</u> there.

Pray that the assisted suicide bill will be effectively scrutinised, that MPs will be made aware of the immense dangers of this legislation, and that it will be voted down at third reading.
