- Teacher sacked for social posts raising concerns about two-tier policing
- Jennifer Melle: "I was abandoned by RCN during biggest crisis of my life"

Christian teacher Simon Pearson has launched legal action with the help of our legal team after he was <u>sacked for Facebook posts commenting on the Southport</u> and Manchester airport attacks.

After he posted raising concerns about what he saw as 'two-tier justice', an Islamic representative of the National Education Union (NEU) threatened to go to the police and the media if Preston College did not sack Simon.

The case raises critical questions about the balance between workplace conduct, personal beliefs, and the right to speak freely on matters of public concern.

"I am appalled by the way I've been treated ... I've dedicated my life to education and to supporting students from all walks of life ... Yet as soon as I was branded 'Islamophobic' for expressing concern about violent crime, I became a marked man. It was clear that I had to be found guilty by the College, it became a witch hunt, and I had to be eliminated no matter what ... I am determined to fight for justice and for the freedom to raise legitimate concerns in public and private as part of national debates on extremely serious issues that impact us all."

His story first <u>broke in the Telegraph</u>, leading to Simon being interviewed by <u>GB News</u>, <u>Talk TV</u> and the Telegraph's <u>'The Daily T'</u> podcast.

<u>The Times</u>, the <u>Daily Mail</u>, the <u>Express</u>, <u>Spiked</u> and <u>Christian Today</u> also covered the story, with Rakib Ehsan commenting twice on the case, discussing its <u>implications for free speech</u> and on how <u>Christianity gets less protection than other faiths in modern-day Britain</u>.

In an <u>interview with the Express</u>, Jennifer Melle has said that the Royal College of Nursing (RCN) abandoned her during the most traumatic period of her life.

She said: "During the biggest crisis in my life, the Royal College of Nursing abandoned me for over a year. I reached out for help when I was at my most vulnerable, but they left me to face this ordeal alone."

<u>Jennifer was racially abused by the patient and threatened with assault</u>. But rather than being protected, she has been suspended and is being investigated as a 'risk' to the NHS for whistleblowing about how she was disciplined for indirectly 'misgendering' a transgender paedophile patient.

A paying RCN member for 12 years, Jennifer says that when the incident happened, the union dismissed her case as not "meritorious" and told her to complete a "reflection" exercise to avoid future 'misgendering'. She received no support despite the RCN recognising the abuse she experienced.

Our legal team is backing Jennifer's case. The <u>Darlington Nursing Union</u> has now also written to the RCN asking it to support Jennifer.

Pray that Jennifer would be vindicated and that she would see increasing public and political support as her case progresses.

For six years, the Church of England has stopped one of its own chaplains from fulfilling his ministry.

Commenting on street preacher <u>John Steele's recent case win</u>, our Head of Public Policy, <u>Tim Dieppe</u>, <u>says creating an official definition of 'Islamophobia' will only</u> make the situation worse.

While Islamic-motivated grooming gangs have been swept under the rug and Christians are arrested for questioning Islam, we cannot welcome in a 'backdoor blasphemy law'.

"If that happens, there will be even more arrests of street preachers. People will start losing their jobs for saying something someone perceives as Islamophobic. We will have, in effect, an Islamic blasphemy code, and yet more two-tier policing."

Street preacher John Steele, arrested after raising questions about how Islamic teachings condone domestic abuse, <u>spoke to GB News about his case</u>. With the support of the Christian Legal Centre, he was vindicated and had all charges against him dropped.

Our Head of Public Policy Tim Dieppe appeared on Revelation TV to discuss whether Christians should be involved in culture wars.

"The only reason that we think slavery, infanticide and paedophilia is wrong is because of Christianity," he said as he tackled difficult questions about life, family and Islam.

In a similar vein, Tim Dieppe also <u>reviewed Bijan Omrani's latest book</u>, 'God is an Englishman: Christianity and the Creation of England', saying it demonstrates how "Nothing can compare with the influence of Christianity on these Islands."

"It is an outrage that public money is still being squandered while women fight for basic rights," writes <u>Janice Turner about safe single-sex spaces in the Times</u>.

She also mentions the Darlington Nurses and Jennifer Melle, whose cases are being supported by Christian Concern and the Christian Legal Centre.

Meanwhile, the NHS announces it is <u>postponing a ban on allowing biological men</u> (who identify as women) to access female-only changing rooms until the Autumn.

However, early indications are that the <u>new EHRC guidance will indeed bring</u> about proper single-sex spaces for women.

Finally, the <u>Times View exposed the insanity of the NHS flouting the Supreme</u> <u>Court ruling on biological sex</u>, saying "Enough is enough. The public sector in general and the health service in particular cannot be allowed to treat the law as optional... It is long past time for ministers to impose their authority in the name of sanity."
